## Mathematical Formulae

## 1. ALGEBRA

Quadratic Equation
For the equation $a x^{2}+b x+c=0$,

$$
x=\frac{-b \pm \sqrt{b^{2}-4 a c}}{2 a}
$$

Binomial Theorem

$$
(a+b)^{n}=a^{n}+\binom{n}{1} a^{n-1} b+\binom{n}{2} a^{n-2} b^{2}+\ldots+\binom{n}{r} a^{n-r} b^{r}+\ldots+b^{n},
$$

where $n$ is a positive integer and $\binom{n}{r}=\frac{n!}{(n-r)!r!}$

## 2. TRIGONOMETRY

Identities

$$
\begin{gathered}
\sin ^{2} A+\cos ^{2} A=1 \\
\sec ^{2} A=1+\tan ^{2} A \\
\operatorname{cosec}^{2} A=1+\cot ^{2} A
\end{gathered}
$$

Formulae for $\triangle A B C$

$$
\begin{gathered}
\frac{a}{\sin A}=\frac{b}{\sin B}=\frac{c}{\sin C} \\
a^{2}=b^{2}+c^{2}-2 b c \cos A \\
\Delta=\frac{1}{2} b c \sin A
\end{gathered}
$$

1 Solve $|5 x+3|=|1-3 x|$.

2 Without using a calculator, express $\left(\frac{1+\sqrt{5}}{3-\sqrt{5}}\right)^{-2}$ in the form $a+b \sqrt{5}$, where $a$ and $b$ are integers. [5]

3 Without using a calculator, factorise the expression $10 x^{3}-21 x^{2}+4$.

4 The point $P$ lies on the curve $y=3 x^{2}-7 x+11$. The normal to the curve at $P$ has equation $5 y+x=k$. Find the coordinates of $P$ and the value of $k$.

5 (i) Show that $\frac{\mathrm{d}}{\mathrm{d} x}\left[0.4 x^{5}(0.2-\ln 5 x)\right]=k x^{4} \ln 5 x$, where $k$ is an integer to be found.
(ii) Express $\ln 125 x^{3}$ in terms of $\ln 5 x$.
(iii) Hence find $\int\left(x^{4} \ln 125 x^{3}\right) \mathrm{d} x$.

6 Show that the roots of $p x^{2}+(p-q) x-q=0$ are real for all real values of $p$ and $q$.

7 (a) Given that $a^{7}=b$, where $a$ and $b$ are positive constants, find,
(i) $\log _{a} b$,
(ii) $\log _{b} a$.
(b) Solve the equation $\log _{81} y=-\frac{1}{4}$.

(c) Solve the equation $\frac{32^{x^{2}-1}}{4^{x^{2}}}=16$.

8 Solutions to this question by accurate drawing will not be accepted.
The points $A$ and $B$ are $(-8,8)$ and $(4,0)$ respectively.
(i) Find the equation of the line $A B$.
(ii) Calculate the length of $A B$.

The point $C$ is $(0,7)$ and $D$ is the mid-point of $A B$.
(iii) Show that angle $A D C$ is a right angle.

The point $E$ is such that $\overrightarrow{A E}=\binom{4}{-7}$.
(iv) Write down the position vector of the point $E$.
(v) Show that $A C B E$ is a parallelogram.

9 A function f is defined, for $x \leqslant \frac{3}{2}$, by $\mathrm{f}(x)=2 x^{2}-6 x+5$.
(i) Express $\mathrm{f}(x)$ in the form $a(x-b)^{2}+c$, where $a, b$ and $c$ are constants.
(ii) On the same axes, sketch the graphs of $y=\mathrm{f}(x)$ and $y=\mathrm{f}^{-1}(x)$, showing the geometrical relationship between them.

(iii) Using your answer from part (i), find an expression for $\mathrm{f}^{-1}(x)$, stating its domain.

10 Solve the equation
(i) $4 \sin \left(3 x-\frac{\pi}{4}\right)=3$ for $0 \leqslant x \leqslant \frac{\pi}{2}$ radians,
(ii) $2 \tan ^{2} y+\sec ^{2} y=14 \sec y+3$ for $0^{\circ} \leqslant y \leqslant 360^{\circ}$.


The diagram shows part of the curve $y=x^{3}+4 x^{2}-5 x+5$ and the line $y=5$. The curve and the line intersect at the points $A, B$ and $C$. The points $D$ and $E$ are on the $x$-axis and the lines $A E$ and $C D$ are parallel to the $y$-axis.
(i) Find $\int\left(x^{3}+4 x^{2}-5 x+5\right) \mathrm{d} x$.
(ii) Find the area of each of the rectangles $O E A B$ and $O B C D$.
(iii) Hence calculate the total area of the shaded regions enclosed between the line and the curve. You must show all your working.

12 The function g is defined, for $x>-\frac{1}{2}$, by $\mathrm{g}(x)=\frac{3}{2 x+1}$.
(i) Show that $\mathrm{g}^{\prime}(x)$ is always negative.
(ii) Write down the range of $g$.

The function h is defined, for all real $x$, by $\mathrm{h}(x)=k x+3$, where $k$ is a constant.
(iii) Find an expression for $\mathrm{hg}(x)$.
(iv) Given that $\operatorname{hg}(0)=5$, find the value of $k$.
(v) State the domain of hg.
