

#### Section A: Imaginative writing

- Write the opening of a story called *On The Run*, about a person who has to change their identity and move to a new location. In your writing, create a sense of mystery and apprehension.
- Write two contrasting pieces (300–450 words each): the first about an astronaut in space, looking down on Earth; and the second about a young child on Earth, looking up at the moon. In your writing, focus on the feelings of each person, and create a sense of wonder.
- **3** Write a descriptive piece called *The Skyscraper*. In your writing, focus on the light, and the colour and scale of the building to help your reader imagine the scene.

## Section B: Writing for an audience

- 4 You recently went to a music festival in your country. Write a review of the festival, which will be published in your school magazine.
- 5 Two speakers are going to take part in a debate on homework. One of the speakers recognises the benefits of homework; the other speaker feels that students should not have to do more schoolwork at home. Write the texts of their speeches (300–450 words each).
- Write the voiceover script for a TV report on a popular local event. The script should cover part of the event itself, and some brief discussion of it afterwards. In your writing, create a sense of atmosphere and enjoyment.

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
